GAME DESCRIPTION

In this card game we pay tribute to the citizens of Split who have directed their desire to help, free time and generosity towards the well-being of their fellow citizens and the development of the city of Split. **Get to know the Split Faces of Solidarity!**

The goal of the game is to match 4 pairs of Split faces of solidarity. One pair consists of a card featuring a face and a card describing their accomplishments (visible on the edge of the paired cards).

GAME PREPARATION

After thoroughly shuffling all the cards, deal 5 cards faced down to each player.

The remaining cards are placed faced down in the middle of the table (the "closed deck"), and the top card is turned over and placed beside the closed deck to form the "open deck".

The player sitting to the left of the dealer starts the game, and the play proceeds clockwise.

GAMEPLAY

Each player's turn consists of 2 phases:

1st phase: The player draws 1 card from the closed or open deck (if it completes a pair the player already has in hand) and adds it to their hand.

2nd phase: The player plays one card from their hand. If he has a completes pair in his hand, the player places both cards in front of them on the table. If he has an action card, the player follows the instructions on the card. If he has some other card, the player places it on top of the open deck. If he has a joker card, the player can form a pair with any other card from their hand or the open deck.

IMPORTANT!

- Action cards are disposable; once they are used they go into a special deck on the side.
- · During their move, the player can make only one pair.
- It is impossible to make a pair of a joker card and another joker card or an action card, the joker card can only serve as a substitute for the face card or the description of the accomplishments.

 If no new cards can be drawn from the closed deck, the top two cards from the open deck are left for play, and the rest of the cards are turned face down and become the closed deck.

MORE ABOUT SPLIT FACES OF SOLIDARITY

Antonio Bajamonti

Prominent doctor and politician from 19th-century Split, who also served as the city's mayor. He frequently invested his own funds into city projects, constructing Prokurative square and the Teatro Bajamonti theater, now known as the City Youth Theater in Split. He also restored the Diocletian's aqueduct, and thus brought drinking water to Split after 1500 years.

Cousins Luka Karaman and Ante Bezić

They were born in the 19th century. During their studies they were attending firefighting courses, as well as courses on organizing fire brigades. Together, they initiated, founded, and presided over the Volunteer Fire Department in Split, which improved the city's fire protection system and thus benefited the community.

Brothers Vice and Tonči Piplović

Brothers of Palma Piplović, a renowned anti-fascist fighter from Split. During a time when the Varoš neighborhood was full of children, they donated a parcel of family land to build a kindergarten. The kindergarten, now named Tamarin Kindergarten, was built in 1962 and serves as the only public monument to Palma Piplović in Split.

Ana Lešina

Physiotherapist and neurotherapist who uses her knowledge to enrich the lives of those in need. She has devoted her time to volunteering with the "Zvono" association for people with intellectual disabilities and the "Parkinson and Us" association. She was awarded the Pride of Croatia award for 2016 and the Personal Award of the City of Split in the same year.

Lana Iljadica and Lada Štefek

These humanitarians encouraged their fellow citizens to prepare dinner once a year for the users of the MoSt Homeless Shelter. This initiative led to the establishment of the charitable action "O La La 366 dinners" in 2011. On the International Volunteer Day 2012, this action was declared the best of its kind in Split, and it received the national Pride of Croatia award that same year.

Sisters Milka and Tonka (Antica) Matošić

Sisters from an old Split laborer family that donated a 4000-square-meter parcel in Mejaši to the Lovret Catholic association and contributed two million kunas for the construction of a facility for the care of the elderly and deprived. Despite owning a large property, they chose to direct their wealth towards helping others, living modestly of their pensions. The "Matošić" Hospice for residents of Split and Dalmatia was built in 2022.

Dina Levačić

Croatian long-distance swimmer, holder of the title of the first Croatian woman to swim across the English Channel. She has also successfully completed all seven major open water swimming marathons, known as the "Ocean's Seven". Every year on The Feast of Saint Dominus, she swims to the Split waterfront for charitable purposes.

Marko Sučić and Siniša Šunjić

Founders of the "Bearded Auction" campaign, which has been operating since 2017 with the aim of raising funds for the County League Against Cancer. The auction works in a way that someone nominates a "beard" for shaving by donating money and the nominee "wins" a shaved beard. The collected money is donated to charity.

Kajo Dadić

In the times burdened by money and material values, he generously donated his properties for humanitarian purposes. As a gesture of gratitude and in accordance with the "MI" association established the "Kajo Dadić" foundation in 2005 which provides scholarships to students from disadvantaged backgrounds in Split, in accordance with his wishes.

Gajo Filomen Bulat

He was a mayor of Split in the 19th-century. Prominent for advocating the introduction of the Croatian language in schools and the municipal administration, the Croatization of street and square names in Split, the education of women, and the railway connection of Split with the hinterland.

Silvana Ćurković

For many years she was dedicated to providing assis-

tance to those who are sick, powerless, and socially disadvantaged. For her dedication and selfless help, she has rightfully been awarded numerous recognitions and awards.

Tomislav Gabelić, Bernard Jurišić, Marin Maljković and Blaž Duplančić Since 2011 four sports journalists from Split, known as "4N", have been organizing an annual humanitarian campaign collect-

ing food and hygiene items for the needs of homeless in Split and the needs of the social self-service of the MoST association.

Vinka Bulić

Scenes of deprivation, poverty and hunger deeply moved Vinka Bulić encouraging her to engage in humanitarian work and continuous fundraising with a special emphasis on supporting poor children. She stressed the importance of solidarity and care for the most vulnerable members of society, such as women and children.

Ivan Manger

A 19th century lawyer from Split distinguished himself as a humanitarian, often providing legal aid to the poor pro bono, that is, free of charge. He was a member and activist in numerous cultural and charitable organizations, including the Slavic National Reading Room, Caritas and the food bank.

Vinka Luković

Known as the "Croatian Mother Teresa", Vinka took care of the wounded in the Split hospital

during the Homeland War, organized the procurement of food for poor families, and mainly focused on the hobbies of the disabled and the poor. Since 2010, the Annual Award for the Development and Promotion of Volunteering has been named after her.

Davor Belaić

Simultaneously with his regular teaching duties, he was additionally involved with students from the 5th to 8th grade of the Sućidar Elementary School. He believed that education should go beyond academic instruction and emphasized the importance of providing additional support to students. He paid special attention to ecology and humanitarian work. Since 2019, the Annual Award for Volunteer Coordinators in Educational Institutions bears his name.

Dragica Tomašković

She is a mother of eight children to whom she has shown extraordinary love and devotion. Her greatness lies in the fact that she not only raised her biological child, but along with her son, she adopted and raised seven children, providing them with love, support and the joy of childhood.

Yolanda Tabak Raibaldi

During the Homeland War, she developed a promotional scheme to collect funds, especially for children, using her political contacts in France. She organized seven

convoys of humanitarian aid and founded the "Croatia-France" association in Corsica in order to familiarize the French with the situation in Croatia.

Edita and Uwe Muller

They decided to adopt and raise a brother and sister, Mustafa and Verica Halilović, providing them with safety, support and family love. Their selfless gesture ensured the brother and sister a better future and a chance for happier life.

Joško Kalilić

In 2015, he started a volunteer campaign to clean and decorate the Turkish Tower in Split. His commitment and the organization of volunteers enabled the citizens of Split to use the park for walking and sports activities. During the Homeland War, in 1992, he was organizing and coordinating construction work and, with the help of donors, he opened the Firule heliport.

Brothers Frane and Petar Ergovac

As it was the last wish of their brother Ante, Petar and Frane completed the establishment of the first city hospital in Split in 1794. Their initiative was aimed at providing health care for the poor population. For that purpose the Civil Hospital of St. Lazar was built on the area of today's Cornaro rampart.

Andrija Lipanović

Through the humanitarian campaign "Push Andrija", he collected funds to purchase robotic aids for people who cannot walk independently. Additionally, in a period of four months, he traveled 7,000 kilometers in a wheelchair with the aim of documenting and raising awareness of places inaccessible to people with disabilities.



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
